Dr. Sudip Bose

Sudip Bose is an emergency medicine physician at Medical Center Hospital in Odessa, Texas and serves as the Medical Director for Ector County and the City of Odessa, Texas. Sudip was listed in "America's Guide to Top Emergency Physicians" for the last several years. Dr. Bose is an associate professor at University of Illinois College of Medicine and also holds faculty positions at Texas A&M, and University of Texas. He is a Fellow of the American College of Emergency Physicians and a Fellow of the American Academy of Emergency Medicine.

Motivated by duty and honor to his country, Sudip, a former Major in the U.S. Army, served as military officer from 1995-2007. His 15 month tour on the front lines of Iraq marked one of the longest combat tours by a physician since World War II. During his deployment Dr. Bose cared for thousands of wounded soldiers and Iraqi civilians. He provided front line emergency care during the peak of insurgencies in Baghdad and Najaf. In addition Dr. Bose was one of the only front line physicians in Fallujah during the U.S. seizure of the city. Dr. Bose treated Saddam Hussein shortly after his capture. When not on missions, Dr. Bose volunteered his free time by serving at the busiest trauma center in the world at that time, the Ibn Sina Hospital. For his service, he received Presidential recognition and earned several awards including the Bronze Star, The Combat Medical Badge, and The Army Commendation Medal. As founder of TheBattleContinues.org and an active member of the Board of Directors of the American Occupational Therapy Association, Dr. Bose is championing efforts to raise awareness and funding for wounded veterans and the families of fallen soldiers, especially with posttraumatic stress disorder.

Sudip Bose, M.D. is a graduate of Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine. As part of the prestigious Honors Program in Medical Education, Sudip gained acceptance to medical school while in high school. He subsequently completed internship and residency at Darnall Army Medical Center, the military's busiest emergency department, where he served as Chief Resident. Afterwards, he completed a fellowship in teaching by the American College of Emergency Physicians. Through various leadership roles during his training, valuable lessons were learned which form the foundation for his service endeavors today.
